WATER FOR THIRSTY SOULS

As I write this, we are halfway through one of the hottest "hot" seasons on record in our West African host country. For three months, we typically see increased water cuts in our city. In surrounding villages, hand-dug wells often dry up during these times.

Hot season is hard on everyone, but especially women, because they are responsible for getting water for their families. During water cuts, urban women awake in the middle of the night to be in line at the neighborhood faucet when the water is restored. Village women might have to walk several miles to a drilled well to get water if the hand-dug well is dry.

In one village, the hand-dug well in the church courtyard had dried up. It not only serves the church but also the many unbelievers who come there desperate for water. They may not know it yet, but they are also desperate for a Savior. As we looked at the well, the pastor said, "If you are willing, you could help us with this." He was speaking not just for himself and his family but for the hundreds of people in his village who were without water.

The Alliance has a long history of partnering with communities to provide access to clean water. Just as Jesus was moved with compassion by the suffering He encountered during His earthly ministry, we are moved with compassion by the suffering we encounter today. But it is not enough to feel compassion; we must also be willing to act—as Jesus did. Christ's love compelled us to visit this pastor and his church family, to encourage them from God's Word, and to provide them with a drilled well. "The village women start arriving at 3:00 a.m.," the pastor reported, "and someone is pumping water all day!"

We are thankful for all who provide the resources that enable us to show compassion to those in need! Pray that we will intentionally lean in to help as we are able. Pray also that as unchurched villagers enter the church courtyard to draw water, they—like the Samaritan woman at the well—will encounter Jesus, the One who can provide them with Living Water.
